SESSION I: The panelists

SIA AMMA is Africa's most outrageous sex educator, encouraging others to talk about female genital mutilation and examine attitudes about women's sexuality. A graduate of San Francisco State University with a degree in speech communication and drama, she went on to develop and perform one-woman shows: What Mama Said About Down There; Clitoris Celebration: Think Outside the Box; In Search of My Clitoris and Salute to the Vulva. The last two are due to be published in fall 2015. Her company Global Women Intact nurtures arts of the African diaspora and uses dance, music, theater, comedy and education to raise awareness of the beauty and complexity of African cultures and their impact on health and wellbeing. GWI is devoted to raising awareness about female genital cutting (fgc) and provides alternative, arts-based and culturally appropriate rites of initiation that honor the intact and healthy bodies of girls and women. RUBY BERRYMAN has been artistic director of the Reader's Theatre Workshop in Lancaster, NH since 2005 teaching community play development workshops and directing classical plays. Her playwriting credits include: Fish on Friday; People Farm; Shopping for Men: The Musical; Everyman; and The Remix. She explores themes of love, genocide and the conundrums caused by modern science. Her essay "Distilling Genocide into Drama: Adaptation of Holocaust and Slave Narratives to the Stage" has received international recognition and has been published in the Canadian journal The Quint. In 2014, as Artist in Residence at a Vermont correctional facility, she guided the inmates in writing Englewood Boys. The theatre piece was inspired by watercolor portraits by Chicago artist Julian Williams. These were exhibited at the Catamount Arts Center concurrent with the play's premiere. Ruby is a graduate of the University of California San Diego (BA, Theatre/Playwriting) and Spalding University (MFA, Playwriting). CHERYL COONS has written more than a dozen musicals that have received professional productions. She currently serves as teaching artist and program manager for Storycatchers Theatre, a youth development arts organization that engages court-involved and at-risk youth in writing, producing and performing original musical theatre. The Chicago-based company incorporates kids' challenges, experiences, dreams and hopes into their art, allowing them to find their voices, set goals and make better life choices. SUZE ALLEN is an author, editor, writing coach, playwright, dramaturg, theatre professional and teacher. In 2011, she founded 3Girls Theatre Company with AJ Baker and Lee Brady. She is 3Girls' resident dramaturg, playwright, playwriting instructor and director of GirlWrights. She recently staged Girl Talk: Boys, Bullies and Body Image, based on the book by Dr. Carol Langlois, empowering young women with shared stories. Her own plays explore the intersection between women's mental health, motherhood and politics. Hanging on Your Every Word: A Journey Through Depression and Suicide was featured at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival and in Anchorage, Alaska. Suze works with Sia Amma's Global Women Intact as director and dramaturg. She is co-author with Dr. SD Shanti of The Time-Starved Woman's Guide to Emotional Wellbeing – Tools and Strategies for Balance (Basilea Press), now in its second printing. She teaches transformational workshops for women with Jnana Gowen at Esalen Institute (Big Sur and Catalina Island). A writing coach, she also runs Manuscript Mentor and leads workshops for women and children. A proud member of the Dramatists Guild, she serves the Bay Area as Regional Representative.
